We are honored to have reached this milestone and we welcome you to this year's festival. Our festival has turned into something we never could have imagined in 2001. Since its beginning, RJFF attendance has grown from 1,500 attendees in 2001, to more than 5,500 in 2009. The average number of people in attendance per film has grown from 115 in our first year, to 305 per film last year. This year we are presenting 22 films from eight countries making the 2010 festival the biggest in our history. Together we discover the diversity of Jewish life and culture, and issues and concerns within and beyond the Jewish community. This year's films are no exception. There are more fiction (narrative) films than ever before as well as several highly acclaimed documentaries and short films. So, sit back and enjoy!

SURRENDER

Director: Edward Sloman, US, 1927, 77 min., Silent, Narrative

After a marvelous reception in 2009 with the silent film *His People*, RJFF is pleased to offer another delightful silent film with live piano accompaniment by Rochester's own Philip Carli. One of the few American silent feature films to deal with life in a European shtetl, *Surrender* is filled with details of village life and Jewish customs. Based on the book "Lea Lyon" by Alexander Brody, the film's story unfolds on the eve of WWI in an Austrian village where the Chief Rabbi's daughter Lea, encounters Prince Constantine, a Russian officer. Lea's passion for the Prince and her concern for the lives of the villagers conflict with her father's views. In this plot-twisting melodrama about political and personal passions, it can be hard to separate the heros from the traitors.

Director: Adam Elliot, Australia, 2009, 92 min., English, Narrative

The opening night selection of the 2009 Sundance Film Festival, Mary and Max is a clayography feature film from Academy Award® winning writer/director Adam Elliot featuring the voice talents of Toni Collette (Mary) and Rochester's own Philip Seymour Hoffman (Max). Spanning 20 years and two continents, Mary and Max explores the relationship of an unusual set of pen-pals. Mary Dinkle a chubby, lonely 8 year-old living in the suburbs of Melbourne, Australia, and Max Horovitz an obese, 44 year-old Jewish man living with Asperger syndrome in the chaos of New York City. As Mary and Max chronicles Mary's trip from adolescence to adulthood, and Max's passage from middle to old age, it explores a bond that survives much more than the ups and downs of an average friendship. A MATTER OF SIZE (Sippur Gadol)

Directors: Erez Tadmor, Sharon Maymon, France/Germany/Israel, 2009, 90 min., Hebrew /Japanese w/ subtitles. Narrative

A Matter of Size is the hit Israeli comedy that has been playing to packed houses and rapturous laughter at film festivals around the world. Nominated for 13 Israeli Academy Awards including Best Picture, the film is "ludicrously funny" (Variety) and "hilarious" (MTV). With echoes of The Full Monty in both its blue-collar setting and its themes, A Matter of Size is a tender and funny look at an overweight chef and his three friends from the small Israeli city of Ramle as they abandon their weight-loss group and decide instead to pursue sumo wrestling. SAVIORS IN THE NIGHT

(Unter Bauern)

Director: Ludi Boeken, Germany, 2009, 95 min., German/French/English w/ subtitles, Narrative



The riveting, real-life drama of a Jewish family who found refuge with Westphalian farmers during WWII, Saviors in the Night is a powerful, humanityaffirming story in the face of barbarism. The Spiegel family escapes the last of the death camp deportations and is offered safe hiding for nearly 3 years by salt-of-the-earth German peasants who reject fascism and put themselves at grave risk without hesitation. Danger lurks constantly as SS officers, Nazi youth groups and frightened citizens threaten to expose the refugees and their protectors. Today, the names of these courageous farmers are immortalized at the Yad Vashem memorial in Israel. Based on the memoirs of the now 97-year-old Marga Spiegel, Saviors in the Night is a refreshingly unsentimental memorial to these silent heroes.

Aaron (stage veteran Zohar Strauss), a respected butcher and a family man in an ultra-Orthodox neighborhood in Jerusalem, leads a conservative life of community devotion and spiritual dedication. His life undergoes a series of emotional changes following the arrival of Ezri (Israeli heartthrob Ran Danker) a young apprentice to his shop. Consumed with lust, the handsome yeshiva student irreversibly transforms the intricate beliefs in the oncedevoted butcher's life – leading Aaron to question his relationships with his wife, children, community and God. Zohar Strauss won the 2009 Jerusalem Film Festival Best Actor award for his breakthrough portrayal of a man tormented by traditional religious boundaries in Israel.

KILLING KASZTNER: The Jew Who Dealt with the Nazis

Director: Gaylen Ross, US, 2008, 120 min., English/ Hebrew w/ subtitles, Documentary



True stories rarely contain a historic mystery, a courtroom drama, a political murder and a family saga, but all can be found in the documentary Killing Kasztner. In Nazi occupied Hungary, Rezso Kasztner, known as the Jewish Schindler, dared to negotiate face to face with Adolf Eichmann to rescue 1700 Jews, and may have saved tens of thousands of more lives. Yet Kasztner was condemned as a traitor in his adopted country of Israel accused as a collaborator in a trial and verdict that divided a nation and forever stamped him as the "man who sold his soul to the devil." It was a verdict overturned by Israel's Supreme Court but it was too late for Kasztner who was assassinated by Jewish right wing extremists in Tel Aviv in 1957. Director Gaylen Ross investigates this tale of murder, intrigue, and heroism through accounts of the inflammatory political trial, startling revelations from Kasztner's assassin, Ze'ev Eckstein, and a chilling meeting between the killer and Kasztner's daughter, Zsuzsi.

Renowned filmmaker Marcos Carnevale tells the story of a terrorist bombing in Buenos Aires that upends the life of a girl with Down syndrome and propels her on a poignant journey. Anita Feldman (an extraordinary debut performance by Alejandra Manzo, an actress with Down syndrome) is lovingly cared for by her mother (Oscar-nominee Norma Aleandro, *Autumn Sun*, RJFF 2002), and spends weekdays helping her run a small stationary store in their Jewish neighborhood. Everything changes when a car bomb explodes outside the AMIA Jewish Community Center. Disoriented in the wake of the attack, Anita wanders the city in search of her missing mother, touching the lives of those around her.

A family of Ethiopian émigrés is torn between love for their homeland and assimilation within Israeli culture in Zrubavel, the first feature-length film created by Ethiopian Israelis. While born and raised in Israel, the Zrubavel family is of Ethiopian heritage. The patriarch of the family is a proud, dignified working man who is determined to see his children succeed beyond him. His dreams for their future are threatened by his children's rebellious choices. Much of the conflict unfolds through the lens of the youngest child, Itzhak who dreams of becoming the, "future Spike Lee of Israel." Zrubavel is a universal story of an immigrant family trying to preserve its heritage in a land where they are viewed as outsiders. Zrubavel is directed by first-time filmmaker Shmuel Beru, who at the age of 8, walked across the Sudanese desert to Israel.

Mischievous 12-year-old Eli (Yuval Shevach) has his sheltered world turned upside down after his father (Lior Ashkenazi, Walk On Water, RJFF 2006), a city architect in the upscale Herzliya community, is charged with taking bribes. News of the scandal makes its way to the school playground and national newspapers. Into this void of disillusionment steps Police Inspector Amos (Tzahi Grad), who presents sympathy but uncertain motives. Forced to question everything he believes. Inspired by the true story of Jewish high jumper Gretel Bergmann, Berlin '36 replays a remarkable piece of forgotten Olympic history. Bergmann (award-winning actress Karoline Herfurth) was considered a top contender for the gold medal at the 1936 Summer Games in Nazi-controlled Berlin. With the Americans threatening an Olympic boycott if Jewish athletes were barred from competing, Bergmann is invited to training camp. But uncomfortable with a Jewish athlete on the Aryan team, the Nazis conspire to replace her with an unknown über-athlete (Sebastian Urzendowsky). Berlin '36 is the exploration of a tenuous friendship between two outsiders who find themselves in unimaginable circumstances.

Through unforeseen events, they are accused of treason. Although innocent, their demand for a retrial falls on deaf ears. Increasingly desperate as they lose their freedom and dignity in prison, they attempt one last-ditch effort to be heard. The Loners is the new long-awaited feature by Renen Schorr, who has influenced a whole generation of young Israeli filmmakers through the world-renowned Sam Spiegel Film School in Jerusalem, which he founded and has led for more than 20 years. Schoor also co-founded the Israeli Film Fund.

Who Do You Love is a toe-tapping biopic rich with sentimental tunes and settings of the 1950s and '60s. Leonard Chess (Alessandro Nivola) rose from obscurity after founding the Chicago-based label Chess Records with his brother Phil. As the music around them changed, so too did their strained family lives. Who Do you Love explores the professional success and personal sacrifices of the Jewish entrepreneurs and rising black artists who reinvented the entertainment world together. Co-directed by a Palestinian and an Israeli, the powerful crime drama *Aiami* is set on the streets of Jaffa's Ajami neighborhood, a melting pot of cultures and conflicting views among Jews, Muslims and Christians, and told through the eyes of a cross-section of the city's inhabitants: a young Israeli (Shahir Kabaha), a Palestinian refugee (Ibrahim Frege), a Jewish police detective (Eran Naim) and an affluent Palestinian (Scandar Copti). As their stories intersect – and the film's narrative shifts back and forth in time – we witness a dramatic collision of worlds and the tragic consequences that can occur when enemies live as neighbors.

Illuminating questions of beauty and self-image through a feminine lens, Camera Obscura is the enchanting and inventive story of a homely woman who recedes into obscurity among a colony of Argentine Jewish immigrants. Born on the docks of a Buenos Aires harbor at the end of the 19th century and rejected by her mother, Gertrudis escapes her ugly duckling adolescence through flights of fancy. Eventually married off to an older, wealthy Jewish rancher and raising a loving family, she appears to have found happiness. When a worldly French portrait photographer is invited to take a family portrait, his surrealist visions reveal the camera-shy Gertrudis in a new light. Artfully blending live action, animation and still photography, Camera Obscura is a lyrical, inventive film from Argentine director Maria Victoria Menis, who has you rooting for Gertrudis from the start.



Stranded in Tel Aviv for 48 hours as repairs are being made, Tarek develops deep and profound connections with three Israelis. Among them is beautiful Keren who is estranged from her Orthodox family. An unlikely love between born enemies blooms by weekend's end when Tarek must make the decision of his life.

The Czech Republic's official entry for 2010 Best Foreign Language Film Oscar, Protektor is a sexy, stylish psycho-thriller about a Prague journalist and his part-Jewish wife Hana, (Jana Plodková), a famous film star, whose lives are ravaged by the outbreak of WWII and Nazi Germany's occupation of Czechoslovakia. Hana's Jewish heritage precipitates her fall from the height of her career to the bottom of the social ladder. Conditions worsen as restrictions on Jews are systematically increased. An assassination and a chance encounter on a bicycle bring their malingering marriage to a crisis. The retro noir style, evocative of 1930s cinema, is enhanced by gorgeous period design and an avantgarde score.

Director: Erik Greenberg Anjou, US, 2010, 108 min., Documentary



For more than 20 years the Klezmatics have been at the vanguard of the international klezmer revival. The Grammy Award-winning group's innovative, lower Manhattan sensibilities have redefined the boundaries of contemporary Jewish music through nine albums and collaborations with such diverse artists as Garrison Keilor, Arlo Guthrie, Itzhak Perlman and Joshua Nelson. In 2006 the band won a Grammy Award for Best World Music with "Wonder Wheel: Lyrics by Woody Guthrie." Following the group for three years through tours in the U.S., Germany and Poland, this strikingly honest documentary reveals the challenges exceptionally creative musicians face as they strive to make joyous, boundary-breaking music and balance the demands of family, career and their own personalities. A FILM UNFINISHED

Director: Yael Hersonski, Germany/Israel, 2009, 87 min., German/Hebrew/Polish/Yiddish w/ English subtitles, Documentary

At the end of WWII, 60 minutes of raw film, having sat undisturbed in an East German archive, was discovered. Shot by the Nazis in Warsaw in May 1942, and labeled simply "Ghetto," this footage quickly became a resource for historians seeking an authentic record of the Warsaw Ghetto. However, the later discovery of a long-missing reel complicated earlier readings of the footage. A Film Unfinished presents the raw footage in its entirety, carefully noting fictionalized sequences (including a staged dinner party) falsely showing "the good life" enjoyed by Jewish urbanites, and probes deep into the making of a now-infamous Nazi propaganda film.

A Film Unfinished is a film of enormous import, documenting some of the worst horrors of our time and exposing the efforts of its perpetrators to propel their agenda and cast it in a favorable light.
