FOLLOW ME: The Yoni Netanyahu Story

Directors: Jonathan Gruber, Ari Daniel Pinchot, USA, 2012, 80 min., Hebrew, English with subtitles, Documentary

This powerful inspiring biography explores the life of Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's older brother, Yonatan – the elite army commando who led Operation Entebbe in 1976. Using Yonatan's poetry and letters, *Follow Me* presents a moving portrait of a young man prone to deep-rooted introspection and heartfelt passion. With its focus on the high-risk mission to save Israeli hostages held in Uganda by Arab terrorists, the film offers a moving portrait of the young man who played a pivotal role in his young country's history. It includes rarely seen footage of the Six Day War and of the raid on Entebbe as covered by Walter Cronkite; newly released archival material, and interviews with the Prime Minister, Defense Minister Ehud Barak and Yonatan's widow. Sunday, July 8, 6:30pm, Dryden Theatre **KADDISH FOR A FRIEND**

Director: Leo Khasin, Germany, 2011, 94 min., Arabic/German/Russian with subtitles. Drama

In Berlin, two lonely, displaced characters – 84-year-old Alexander, a Russian Jewish war veteran who lives on his own, and 14-year-old Ali, who grew up in a Lebanese refugee camp and has relocated with his family to public housing – strike up an unlikely friendship after Ali and his peers vandalize Alexander's apartment. Threatened with deportation for having destroyed Alexander's personal treasures and defacing his walls with anti-Semitic graffiti, Ali is sent by his family to apologize and repair the damage. In this debut film by German director Leo Khasin, Alexander and Ali work side by side, sharing a mutual dislike that dissolves into understanding and then friendship. Inspired by a true story, this stirring film reminds us just how hard it is to unlearn prejudices.

FOOTNOTE

Director: Joseph Cedar, Israel, 2011, 103 min., Hebrew with subtitles, Comedy

In this wry comedy, the competition between rivaling Talmudic scholars is further complicated by the fact that they are father and son. The father, Eliezer, is a purist who has never been recognized for his life's work and fears he will end up a footnote. His son, Uriel, is an up-and-coming star who thrives on the recognition he has received. Things really get interesting when Eliezer is mistakenly informed that he has won the coveted Israel Prize. In truth, the prize was meant for Uriel. Israeli filmmaker Joseph Cedar sees the humorous and satirical elements of Uriel's dilemma and uses them to explore the tug-of-war between admiration and envying a role model, and the fragile complicated relationship between a father and son.


Monday, July 9, 6:00pm, Dryden Theatre **DOLPHIN BOY**

Director: Dani Menkin and Yonathan Nir, Israel, 2010, 72 min., Hebrew with subtitles, Documentary

A father never gives up. When told by top Israeli doctors that "dolphin-assisted therapy" is the last treatment option before his catatonic teenage son, Morad, is institutionalized, he sells everything, leaves his job and family in an Arab village, and moves to "Dolphin Reef" in Eilat on the Red Sea. He vows not to return unless the boy achieves full recovery. Morad had been kidnapped and brutally tortured by classmates. So brutal was the attack, so deep the emotional scars, that Morad, suffering from severe post traumatic stress disorder, disconnects himself from the world around him. This is a true tale of a parent's patient and tender love, the healing powers of nature, and the friendship between a teenage boy and the dolphins that helped him in a remarkable three-year journey of recovery.



MY BEST ENEMY

Director: Wolfgang Murnberger, Austria, 2010, 95 min., German with subtitles, Drama

Suspense, betrayal, romance and reversed identities are the ingredients of *My Best Enemy*, a handsome World War II thriller that kicks off our annual ice cream night! The setting is 1930s Vienna, where art-dealer Victor Kaufman tells Rudi, his best friend and adopted brother, about a valuable drawing secretly in his possession. After the Nazi invasion, Rudi lets out a secret of his own: he is a card-carrying member of the Nazi party who hopes to use the drawing to ingratiate himself with his superiors. The copy that Victor quickly produces becomes a gift from Hitler to Mussolini and trouble ensues when the forgery is discovered. Like *Inglourious Basterds*, this film straddles the fine line between comedy and drama and capitalizes on an unlikely plot with engaging characters.

Director: Ronit Kertsner, Israel, 2011, 72 min., Hebrew, Polish, English, French with subtitles, Documentary




Can one be a Catholic priest and an observant Jew at the same time? Raised by a gentile family and ordained as a Polish Catholic priest, Father Romuald Waszkinel discovers at age 35 that he was born Jacob Weksler to Jewish parents who died in the Holocaust. His is an amazing journey from conducting mass in a Polish church to a new life as a practicing Jew in a religious kibbutz in Israel. Yet, Romuald remains spiritually torn between his two identities. He isn't able to renounce either identity and, as a result, is rejected by both. His desire to become an Israeli citizen, meanwhile, is mired in a bureaucratic labyrinth of immigration law. Filmmaker Ronit Kertsner raises profound questions about what it means to be Jewish in this soul-searching, cruelly ironic documentary.

Using rarely seen photographs, archival footage, and interviews with Sholem Aleichem's grand-daughter, author Bel Kauffmann, and a broad range of scholarly experts, this riveting portrait of the world's greatest Yiddish writer sheds new light on Sholem Aleichem's world and his timeless stories, some of which formed the basis of *Fiddler on the Roof.* Far from the folksy grandfather many people mistakenly believe him to be, Sholem Aleichem (1859-1916) was a rebellious genius, a sophisticated writer and a cosmopolitan intellectual who infused his stories with brilliant humor. His struggles to create a modern Jewish identity left lasting legacies in Israel, the Soviet Union, and America.

Director: Joseph Madmony, Israel, 2011, 105 min., Hebrew with subtitles, Drama



In this rich, unvielding and vet gentle exploration of unfulfilled fathers and sons, master carpenter Jacob Fidelman faces new hardships in Tel Aviv's old industrial district, where he and a partner have run an antique restoration business for 40 years. After the partner dies and leaves his half of the business to Fidelman's estranged son Noah, a hotshot lawyer, the conflicts flare. Noah wants to shutter his business, but Jacob, still seeing a future in it, hires Anton, a new employee who thinks the shop's decrepit 1882 Steinway piano may hold considerable value. This Joseph Madmony film, with its quietly devastating performance by veteran Israeli actor Sasson Gabai, examines how to be a father and/or a son.

Based on the best-selling book by Karen Levine, this stunning new documentary chronicles Fumiko's journey, which will change her life and the lives of thousands of children around the world. With the help of her young Japanese students, Fumiko searches through 70 years of history, traveling across three continents to piece together the details of Hana's life. With dramatic recreations, family photographs, interviews, and a gorgeously orchestrated soundtrack, director Larry Weinstein shares this remarkable story of Fumiko's quest to know Hana.

Tai is 17 years old. Naim is 20. She's Israeli. He's Palestinian. She lives in Jerusalem. He lives in Gaza. Tal experiences a terrorist attack at her local café, but refuses to succumb to hatred and blame. She optimistically slips a message of peace in a bottle that she asks her brother to throw into the sea while he is on patrol near Gaza. Eventually, she receives an email response from Naim, a teenaged Palestinian who calls himself "Gazaman". The two develop a virtual friendship through their email exchanges. Based on the novel by Valérie Zenatti, this lovely and hopeful film avoids any sentimentality or easy answers. Featuring a terrific cast that includes Hiam Abbass (*Lemon Tree, The Visitor*) and Salim Dau (*Arab Labor, Free Men*).

Director: Ofer Inov, Israel, 2011, 54 min., Hebrew with subtitles, Documentary



The colorful and inspiring women in this poignant film may have fluchkes (Yiddish for flabby arms), but that doesn't stop them from creating a memorable dance performance. Over the course of a year, a group of women in their 70s and 80s confront the intense demands of the art of dance and refuse to conform to any stereotypes about aging. They open up about their lives, friendships, rivalries and sexuality, they worry about memory and muscle loss, and they share an unquenchable thirst for life, art, and self-expression. Their rehearsals lead to hardships and failures, to friendships and happiness, and finally to a performance that has their audience riveted.

Set in an impoverished town in present-day Israel, this Jewish folk tale centers on a curious love triangle among the sour and superstitious Rahma; her long-suffering husband, Robert; and the ghost of Rahma's estranged and beautiful sister, Mary, who dies from the pain of banishment after marrying an Arab fisherman. Wracked with guilt, the family's conscience is tested through an emotional and passionate journey with the ghost of Mary.

Inspired by true events, this remarkable love story takes place in a Polish concentration camp in 1944. where romance blossoms between Hannah, a young Jewish woman who is the lone survivor in her family, and Polish political prisoner Tomasz. When Hannah discovers that she is pregnant, it's clear that the odds of surviving have become worse. In a desperate effort to save her. Tomasz dons a stolen SS uniform and walks Hannah out of the camp. The two lose track of each other during the chaos and confusion of the war's end, but their story is far from over. Aided by an impressive cast, beautiful cinematography and an intelligent script, the assured hand of Anna Justice (Max Minski and Me) ably explores the deepest emotions without resorting to cliché or sentimentality.

In this surprising and thought-provoking Israeli/Polish production, 10-year-old Tadek – a Catholic boy living in Łódź, Poland in the 1960s – yearns to live in Australia. He and his brother are arrested for their gang activities, which have a strong anti-Semitic bent, and their mother, a Holocaust survivor, lets them in on a secret: the boys are actually Jewish. She decides the family must leave Poland and tells Tadek that they are going to Australia, the land of his fantasies. Like their real religion, this too isn't as it appears to be. This tender and humorous drama is based on the filmmaker's experiences.

Mary Lou is a colorful and charming musical, part modern fable, part coming-of-age story, about a young gay man named Meir who is on a mission to find his mother. She mysteriously disappears on his 10th birthday, leaving behind only a few old photographs and two of her dresses. Convinced that she must be working as a backup singer for her rock idol, Svika Pick, his search takes him to Tel Aviv, where he becomes a popular drag queen named Mary Lou. Meir soon realizes that he has little chance of finding his mother until he finds himself.



Director: Igaal Niddam, Switzerland, 2008, 116 min., Hebrew with subtitles. Drama



The differences between Dan and Aaron, Argentine brothers with opposing religious philosophies, come to a head when the deeply religious Aaron travels to Jerusalem and, for the first time in 25 years, encounters Dan, a shepherd who lives on a secular kibbutz in southern Israel. Aaron, a distinguished NYC attorney and a Torah scholar, has been asked to defend the right of Orthodox yeshiva students to be exempt from military service, a case that mirrors the intense struggle between Israel's religious and political principles. As might be expected, the brothers cannot understand each other's values or convictions. Their complex story touches on what it means to be Jewish and delves into Israel's ongoing debate about separating "state" from religion.

In this light-hearted and uplifting comedy, Charlie Jones – a former professional ball player with a drinking problem and a prison record – needs to complete 190 hours of community service and hopes to do so by coaching an amateur baseball team. The only team willing to give him a second chance is the Yankles, an upstart club of Orthodox yeshiva students. While the team sees Charlie as a means to success on the field, the world is less forgiving: the media vilifies him and society shuns him. Fortunately, the Yankles shun gossip and judge their coach by his deeds, not his history. If you loved Jews and Baseball last year, you'll love this delightful comedy.

Everything in Yoni's life is complicated. He's almost 13, smart, physically underdeveloped, and obsessed with becoming bigger, taller and stronger. His classmates bully him, his parents are close to separating and uncommunicative, and Yoni's bar mitzvah is approaching. Things get worse when Tomer, an autistic brother who has been institutionalized for years, returns to the family home. With his unstable family on the verge of crumbling, Yoni has no choice but to "become a man" and on his own cope with his brother's obsessive behaviors. Yoni's Torah reading, Noah, leads them to an inventive "flood game," which becomes the source of their common ground.

This pulse-pounding spy thriller – inspired by actual events – shares the little-known story of Muslim freedom fighters who sheltered Jews in a mosque in German-occupied Paris during WWII. When a young, apolitical Algerian, Younes, is arrested for selling goods on the black market, the police make him an offer: go to jail or spy on the Paris Grand Mosque and its shrewd imam. The French suspect the imam of aiding Muslim Resistance agents and providing North African Jews with false identification papers while feigning cordialities with a Gestapo major. A dangerous cat-and-mouse game ensues as the Algerian befriends Salim, a charismatic cabaret singer, with a secret identity. When Salim reveals his secret – he's Jewish – Younes has a change of heart and transforms from an ignorant immigrant to a fully fledged freedom fighter.

Free Men, as our closing night film, is a timely and powerful reminder of the universal struggle for liberation.
