GERMANS AND JEWS

Monday, July 10 at 8:30pm; Little Theatre

Director: Janina Quint and Tal Recanati, USA, 2016, 76 min, English, German w/ English subtitles, documentary

This engaging, thoughtful documentary about the current relationship between Germany and its Jewish population, begins with a lively dinner party. In the middle of the meal, a German woman suddenly shares that she often feels self-conscious uttering the words "Juden" and "Deutschland" and only dares to say them in English. It is a singular moment in the conversation that serves as a metaphor for all of the dinner guests, who come together from diverse backgrounds of faith and nationality, including German-born Jews, Israelis who have immigrated to Berlin, and non-Jewish Germans...a moment that profoundly captures one of the many complexities of this candid film.

Notable interviewees include the late Fritz Stern, a world-renowned historian, Rafael Seligman, an Israeli born German-Jewish writer who publishes *The Jewish Voice* from Germany; and Rabbi Andreas Nachama, born in Germany, and the executive director of the Topography of Terror Museum in Berlin. *Germans and Jews* builds on one of the world's most familiar history lessons, while noting new possibilities for current and future generations to come.








HAROLD AND LILLIAN: A HOLLYWOOD LOVE STORY

Unresolved conflicts and the complexities of growing up with a Down syndrome child in the family come to the surface, while a heartwarming and special closeness develops as they deal with formidable physical and emotional challenges. Through this journey, we see a glimpse into the life of those with Down syndrome as their inspiring natural qualities emerge: wholesomeness, direct and honest emotional expression, and the capacity to feel and communicate unconditional love. The difficult trials and their poignant relationships, set against the richly colorful backdrop of India greatly deepen our understanding of individuals with special needs and their families.

AMOR

Director: Raphaël Rebibo, France, Israel, 2016, 86 min, Hebrew w/ English subtitles, narrative

With stunning cinematography, Amor asks the viewer to consider the true nature of love. After wandering for three years in Europe, Daniel, an abstract artist, returns home to his small farming village in Israel. No one is sure why he has returned or how long he will stay, and Daniel isn't talking. Meanwhile, we meet the Frizer family whose beautiful daughter Lila, a former dancer, is now paralyzed and wants to end her life. Those who love her refuse, protesting that religious law prohibits euthanasia. This lyrical and beautifully shot story explores the depths of love and how memories are simultaneously both fragile and fleeting, but sometimes all that we have.

KEEP QUIET

Director: Joseph Martin, Sam Blair, Hungary, U.K., 2016, 93 min, English, Hungarian w/ English subtitles, documentary

Csanad Szegedi's story is remarkable; as the vicepresident of Jobbik, Hungary's far-right extremist party, Szegedi regularly espoused anti-Semitic rhetoric. He was a founder of the Hungarian Guard, a now-banned militia inspired by the Arrow Cross, a pro-Nazi party complicit in the murder of thousands of Jews during WWII. Then comes a startling revelation which upends his life: Szegedi's maternal grandparents were revealed to be Jewish and his beloved grandmother hid her faith fearing persecution. Keep Quiet openly explores Szegedi's three-year journey as he is guided by Rabbi Boruch Oberlander, to discover his newfound heritage, and the religion it is based on, forcing him to confront the painful truths of his family's past, and most importantly, his own horrific wrong-doing. But is this astonishing transformation a process of genuine reparation and spiritual awakening, or is he simply a desperate man who, having failed to suppress the truth, has nowhere else to turn?





ONE WEEK AND A DAY

Getting stoned and playing air guitar with your next door neighbors' twenty-something son are two activities not commonly associated with the Jewish mourning period. Yet, nothing makes sense after the death of one's own child.

This incredibly tactful tragic comedy is about a middle-aged couple figuring out what to do next and how to begin their lives over again after sitting Shiva for their 25-year-old son, Ronnie. Eyal finds himself grasping for whatever will distract him from returning to the real world, while Vicky remains focused on the path set before her.

Enjoying the nightlife of 1943 Copenhagen, jazz guitarist Arne Itkin is seemingly immune to the hardships of war, as the Danish government opts for a compliant relationship with Nazi Germany. He is initially skeptical when his terrified wife Miriam hears rumors of a "roundup" of Danish Jews. An overnight raid, however, forces the couple to flee their home with their five-year-old son Jakob. 

BEN-GURION: EPILOGUE

Sunday, July 16 at 11am; Dryden Theatre

Director: Yariv Mozer, France, Israel, 2016, 70 min, English, Hebrew w/ English subtitles, documentary

In never before seen footage, the then 82-yearold former prime minister in his final years after leaving office is interviewed at his secluded desert home over the course of several days in 1968. An introspective David Ben-Gurion reflects on the loss of his wife, his personal health and political legacy, and his hopes for Middle East peace. Languishing for decades, the reels of silent footage were inadvertently uncovered in the Steven Spielberg Jewish Film Archive in Jerusalem, with the corresponding soundtrack later found in the Ben-Gurion Archives in the Negev. The restored interview is interwoven with newsreels and other archival materials, including images of the unassuming elder statesman's charmingly simple kibbutz life taking daily strolls and working the farmlands. Two senior citizens discover it's never too late to fall in love, in this unabashedly sentimental romance. An independent, vivacious, operaloving widow Katherine finds herself in an assisted living facility with a broken hip. Determined to make a quick recovery and get back on her feet, she puts on a brave face and tries to ingratiate herself with the other residents, a quirky mix of characters. 


