

Commandment 613: A Sacred Craft

Director: Miriam Lewin | Documentary, Short USA | 2020 | 23 min. | English

Rabbi Kevin Hale joyfully practices the sacred craft of a Torah scribe (sofer), bringing new life to scrolls saved during the Shoah. His work takes him to communities now entrusted with the scrolls. Commandment 613 is the final commandment in the Torah: to write the scroll itself. (Rochester is home to several of these scrolls.)



A Father's Kaddish

Steven Branfman used the craft of pottery to create his own personal kaddish (prayer) after the death of his son, a gifted potter who attended Alfred University's renowned College of Ceramics. But when her parents decide to flee Germany before the rise of the Third Reich, her life is upended. Directed by Oscar-winning director Caroline Link and based on Judith Kerr's beloved semi-autobiographical book, the film is a loving tribute to Kerr, who passed away last year.


Ma'Aborot: The Israeli Transit Camps




