The Dead Sea is dying. Literally. Famed for its exceptional geographical, biological, and historical importance, the lowest point on Earth is drying up, disappearing. This is no act of nature; it's the result of human overconsumption and water mismanagement. But the Dead Sea – shared by Israelis, Jordanians, and Palestinians – is also surrounded by political conflict. In this remarkable, inspiring, true story, people put politics aside to try to save the sea. Three men, from the three different backgrounds, embark on a heroic and extremely dangerous act to draw international attention to the sea's plight.

Humorous and heartbreaking, sharply observed and deeply touching, it launched Silver's career, made Carol Kane a star (she received an Oscar nomination for the performance). and won the hearts of audiences and critics everywhere. This stunning restoration will create a generation of new fans and remind old ones why they fell for Hester Street years ago.

Welcome to a world we rarely see and the most unusual family we may ever meet. Cleo, his wife and 15 (!) children live on a "family commune" in a Brazilian forest. Farming, selling ceramics, enjoying the spectacularly beautiful environment, they seem to have found paradise. They've also embraced Judaism and discovered the family tree has Jewish roots. But when the question of converting and making aliyah (moving to Israel) is raised, the tree starts shaking. Gorgeously shot over 6 years, whisking us from Brazil to Argentina, Israel, and back, Leaving Paradise explores a host of complex issues including Jewish identity, family dynamics, and the power of patriarchy.

Based on a provocative autobiography, filled with both humor and drama, Wet Dog powerfully examines how current politics and age-old prejudices affect the already painful adolescent search for identity and friendship.





As an unusual, complex relationship develops between the two men, this extremely tense, weirdly funny film builds to a grimly satisfying powerhouse finale.



Like nothing you've ever seen, this is a totally unique film about an equally unique film. A home movie – shot in a small Polish town in 1938 and discovered in a South Florida attic – becomes the springboard for a meditation about images and their relation to reality. This is also a history of the murder of the town's Jews and a detective story about how the town and some people in it were identified—including a Jewish survivor, now 97, who watches himself as a child.

RJFF Mission Statement

The Louis S. Wolk Jewish Community Center of Greater Rochester established the Ames Amzalak Rochester Jewish Film Festival (RJFF) in 2001 to present the best contemporary Jewish-themed films from around the world to the Rochester community.
