He was flamboyant, outspoken, and a master of reinvention. He was also one of the greatest photographers of the 20th century – a brilliant artist whose body of work spans decades, and continents. Roman Vishniac documented Jewish life in Eastern Europe before and after WWII, providing the last visual records of an entire world. In a stunning shift, he turned almost exclusively to scientific photography where he made considerable contributions in the field of microscopy. Now, for the first time, Vishniac's story is told. Vishniac's late son Wolf, a distinguished microbiologist, spent his career at the University of Rochester. Wolf's son Ethan, one of the film's narrators, is an equally distinguished astronomer who grew up in Rochester and graduated from the University of Rochester.

In this snappy, Toronto-set musical comedy, a failing singer-songwriter Viv (actor-musician Shaina Silver-Baird) returns to her hometown just in time for her younger sister's Bat Mitzvah - where she feels like a gefilte fish out of water. In order to set her back on the right path, her rabbi enlists her as a part-time cantor, but that creates its own problems - like the attractive but off-limits rabbi's son. Originally developed as a web-series, Less Than Kosher won four awards at Canada's 2023 T.O. Webfest, including the Grand Prize for Best Web Series and the awards for Best Comedy, Best Writing, and Best Actor.

To mark the 50th anniversary of the Yom Kippur War, Israel's National Archive has released the official transcripts of Prime Minister Golda Meir's office from the time of the war – documents unknown to the public until now. Dozens of documents describe what took place in Israel's seat of power at the time, including accounts of the minor moments that led to major decisions during the war. These documents leave no room for doubt, Golda did not fail. In fact, Israel's achievements resulting from the war made it possible, five years later, to reach a peace agreement with Egypt.

Seven Blessings swept the Israel Ophir Awards with 10 wins including Best Film, and was Israel's official entry to the Academy Awards. This bittersweet dramedy is set in early '90s Jerusalem where Marie, a Moroccan Jewish bride, returns to Israel after 40 years to marry Dan, the son of French Ashkenazi parents. The wedding is preceded by a traditional week of celebratory meals (sheva brachot) with her large, boisterous family tribe, whose strong opinions and ancient customs put secrets and lies on the menu. As the joyful façade slowly breaks down, a painful wound from the past is exposed.
