Weekly Torah Wanderings with Rabbi Michael Silbert

Tuesdays, beginning November 19, 10–11am; Yiddish Room

Join us for an exploration into the week's Torah reading as we examine this ancient text together, connecting with its enduring meaning and drawing on its contemporary relevance. In addition to understanding Torah in its historic context, we shall discover how it continues to speak to us in our current day by bringing the insights of a range of interpreters—both classic and modern—and finding ways to contribute our own voices.

Rabbi Michael Silbert was born and grew up in Cape Town, South Africa, where it never occurred to him that he might one day become a rabbi! More than ten years after beginning Graduate School at Brandeis University, he found himself—much to his own surprise—beginning his rabbinical studies at The Rabbinical School of Hebrew College, in Newton, Massachusetts. He acknowledges that "At age 35, married, with a newborn and a mortgage, I realized that becoming a rabbi actually made sense to me, even if the timing didn't!"




Rabbi Or Zohar

Or Zohar came to serve as Temple Sinai's Senior Rabbi in the Summer of 2024. Rabbi Zohar moved to Rochester with his family from the Galilee, Israel, where he served for eight years as the Reform Rabbi of the Misgav Regional Council. Previously, Rabbi Zohar served as the rabbi of Congregation Ma'a lot Tivon in Kiryat Tivon, and as the founding rabbi of Kehilat Halev. Parallel to his work at the pulpit, Rabbi Zohar served as the founding director of the Spirit of the Galilee, an organization that promotes inter-religious and intercultural dialogue between Jews, Christians, Muslims and Druze in northern Israel.


Week 1: The 10 Martyrs; Why do we read this on Yom Kippur?

Lauren Deutsch, Esq. is an attorney, activist, and Torah scholar, living in Rochester, New York with her husband and three children. Lauren worked in migrant women's health services prior to law school, and began her legal career representing survivors of domestic violence at The Legal Aid Society of Rochester in 2010. She has worked in reproductive justice, labor justice, and currently works in disability justice as the Executive Director of Disability Law United, a national legal services organization.

Lauren's research interests include bruising injuries in victims of color, effective care and services for clients living with trauma, and the impact of poverty on health equity. Lauren lectures on Jewish topics in family law, biblical literature, and Jewish philosophy, and is currently a scholar at Ohr Torah Stone's International Halakhic Scholars program.

Nora Rubel is the Jane and Alan Batkin Professor in Jewish Studies and Chair of the Department of Religion and Classics at the University of Rochester. Rubel teaches and writes on a wide variety of topics related to gender, race and ethnicity in American religion, particularly in relation to food and Judaism. She is the author of Doubting the Devout: The Ultra-Orthodox in the Jewish American Imagination (Columbia University Press 2009), co-editor of Religion, Food and Eating in North America (CUP 2014) and Blessings Beyond the Binary: Transparent and the Queer Jewish Family (Rutgers University Press 2024). She is currently completing a monograph entitled Recipes for the Melting Pot: The Lives of The Settlement Cook Book. She is, however, most proud of her investigative piece entitled "The Case of the Missing Matzo" that asked the hard questions, diving into the Manischewitz Tam Tam shortage prior to Pesach in 2008. Rubel resides in Brighton with her two children, Zoe and Ashe, her two dogs, Don Cheagle and Cosmo Castorini, and her husband Rob Nipe, the Vegan Butcher of Rochester. 
